

HISTORY OF TRINITY EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH OF ARENZVILLE, ILLINOIS 1872 -1972

The very earliest time in which Mission Work was done among the few Germans of the Arenzville community can be traced back to the year 1835. The first services were held in the homes and a Pastor Reiger served these German people. Pastor Reiger seemed to have confessed the Lutheran doctrines.

On May 26, 1872 a group of Lutherans gathered together in a small church known as the "Union Church" to discuss the founding of a Sunday School. Under the leadership of Pastor R. Knoll of Beardstown they drew up a constitution and elected three Elders, Christopher Lovekamp, Henry Lovekamp, and Henry Schaeffer. Pastor Knoll of Beardstown and Pastor Warnke of St. Pauls Bethel served this congregation on alternate Sundays. In the fall of 1872 a Call was extended to Pastor Toewe of Michigan. On April 4, 1873 Pastor Toewe was installed to his office at the "Union Church" in a solemn service.

Pastor Toewe opened a school in the spring of 1873 with 17 pupils in attendance. The tuition was 75¢ a month, which the pastor received and his salary was set at \$350 a year.

A more detailed constitution was then drawn up by Pastor Toewe by copying the constitution of St. John's, Beardstown. After careful discussion the constitution was adopted and on recommendation of the pastor the congregation was named German Evangelical Lutheran Trinity Congregation U.A.C. (Unaltered Augsburg Confession) at Arenzville, Cass County, Illinois. This constitution was signed by Henry Tiemeyer, Gerhardt Roegge, Henry Lovekamp, Christopher Lovekamp, John Schaeffer, John Roegge, Harry Joeckel, Frederick Wessel, Christian Helmkamp, C.F. Lovekamp, Henry Kleinschmidt, and Frederick Dresing. The congregation was incorporated on July 30, 1873.



The congregation now gave serious thought to building its own church. On September 2, 1873, this building was discussed in a voters meeting and a building committee was elected, C.F. Lovekamp, Henry Tiemeyer, and the Pastor. A lot was purchased from Charles Yeck at the cost of \$150. This lot was on the then northwest corner of Frederick Street and Henriette Street, if Henriette Street had continued north as originally planned.

In the very same month, September 1873, the work of building the church was given into the hands of a Mr. Buschman of Beardstown and the third Sunday in Advent, 1873, the church was completed and dedicated to the service of the Triune God.

The next thing that concerned the congregation was joining an orthodox Synod. Pastor Toewe belonged to the Missouri Synod but agreed to go with the congregation. The congregation expressed itself as wanting to go with the pastor and so it was that Trinity, Arenzville, was accepted into the Western District of the Missouri Synod during the Synod's Convention of April 28 to May 5, 1874.

Up until this time school had been held in the church, so it was resolved to build a school in the back of the church. In the summer of 1874 the building was begun and completed.

On October 4, 1874, the congregation celebrated its first Mission Festival.


So came the year 1875, a very important one for the small congregation, for in October it had to dismiss its first pastor with heavy heart to follow a call to St. Louis, Mo. The congregation, at this time, numbered 68 souls, 12 voting members, 17 pupils, 17 children had been baptized, 7 had been confirmed, 5 had been buried, and 1 couple married.

The congregation then called Pastor J.L. Hirschmann, who was installed on October 29, 1875, by Pastor J. Burgen of Jacksonville. The next step was to purchase a reed organ. Up to this time a small house organ of Pastor Toewe's had been carried into the church every Sunday. The new organ was purchased for about \$185.

For the first time in 1876, Mission Festival was celebrated together with Immanuel congregation of Lydda on the eighth Sunday after Trinity. In that year it was held at Lydda, the next at Arenzville, etc.

During the summer of 1877 student R.L. Felke of the Springfield Seminary and other students had assisted Pastor Hirschmann in preaching and teaching, because the pastor had tuberculosis. On October 1, 1877, Pastor Hirschmann was compelled to resign. Pastor John Droegemueller of Nokomis was installed by Pastor Beck of Jacksonville on October 28, 1877.

Property was purchased in the fall of 1878 for the purpose of erecting a parsonage. The parsonage was completed in May of 1879.

Since the spring of 1839 the dead had been buried on a plot of ground which Frederick Love-kamp had set aside on his farm for a cemetery. The next owner Henry Lovekamp followed the same practice. Since no charge

was made for space, Germans came from far and near to bury their dead. In the fall of 1883 an acre of ground was purchased from Henry Lovekamp for \$50. This ground was on the north edge of Arenzville next to the old cemetery. On July 13, 1884, the new cemetery was solemly dedicated.

Next to the church on the east there was a lot on which stood an old frame building. This lot was purchased in the spring of 1890 for \$200.

In the fall of 1895 Pastor Droegemueller accepted a Call to Palapine, Cook County, III. On November 3, 1895, Pastor Eberhardt of Storm City, Chase County, Kansas, accepted a Call to Trinity, Arenzville.

Pastor Eberhardt was unable to come immediately, so a Mr. A. Discher from the Springfield seminary, preached, taught school, and gave confirmation instructions. Under his leadership a choir was formed and sang for the first time on Christmas night of 1895.

On January 12, 1896, Pastor Carl Eberhardt was installed by Pastor Frederick Berg of Beardstown and Professor Herzer of Springfield, Illinois, had the sermon.

For some time now the old school building had proven too small. A new building was erected east of the church and was dedicated May 23, 1897. The old school building was sold to a Dr. Eller Linker for \$35, who used it to enlarge his home directly across the street from the church.

The twenty-fifth anniversary was celebrated on March 27, 1898. At this time the congregation numbered 253 souls, 151 communicants and 46 voting members.

The old church had grown too small, so in January 1910 it was decided to build a new church in the center of the church property. At the end of March 1910 the old church was sold for \$200, with the provision that services could be held in it until the new church was finished. During the same week the old church was moved to the next street, Washington Ave., and in the following weeks the school was moved back to the northeast corner of the church property. The building contract was given to Hahling and Company, of Arenzville. The masonry work was done by Herman Wessler, a member of the congregation. On August 28, 1910, the cornerstone was laid and the church was dedicated on

June 11, 1911. Pastor Droegemueller preached in the morning service. Pastor Merbitz delivered a mission sermon in the afternoon and Pastor Brandt spoke in the evening service.

On February 1, 1914, Pastor Eberhardt received a Call to Chestnut, III. During this vacancy a student pastor, Mr. Joseph Hansen, an Australian served the congregation.

The fifth pastor was the Rev. E.F. Tonn who was installed on July 26, 1914. It was during this period of history that two world wars raged, the influenza epidemic took its toll, and the depression struck the country. World War I claimed the life of one member of the congregation.

The various organizations were begun during this period of Trinity's history. The oldest of these is the Ladies Aid, which was organized in May, 1915, the Walther League on January 15, 1928, Men's Club on October 13, 1929, and a Junior Walther League on April 14, 1932. Up until this time the pastor not only

took care of his duties as a pastor, but also taught school. Pastor Tonn told the congregation that "there are preachers and there are teachers and he was a preacher" and so it was in April, 1916, that a Mr. A.G. Frinke was called as the first teacher of Trinity School. The Sunday School was organized in 1923. The 50th anniversary of the congregation was observed on April 2, 1922.

On July 2, 1916, it was decided to have English services once a month on Sunday evenings. Finally on January 11, 1942, a resolution was passed to drop German services altogether.

On April 23, 1918, a parsonage was purchased on the northwest corner of Peters St. And Washington Ave. On April 27, 1918, the old parsonage was sold and in 1924,

more property was acquired from H.H. Wessler, directly behind the church on Washington Ave., to be used as a teachers house and also as school rooms. Because the house was used for both of these purposes, the children soon gave it the name of "The University".

In 1918, Teacher Frinke accepted a Call to Collinsville, Illinois, so school was again taught by Pastor Tonn, assisted by Miss Lydia Koehne and the following years Miss Frieda Jass assisted. In the summer of 1920 the congregation succeeded in getting a candidate in the person of Wm. Buhrmester. In 1923 Mr. Buhrmester accepted a Call to Washington, Mo. The school was then taught by Mrs. Linda Lovekamp nee' Engelage, Miss Magadlene Drawe, Miss Velma Roegge, and R.A. Krause. The third called teacher was Mr. George

Folkerts who was installed on February 28, 1932. Teacher Folkerts tendered his resignation in the summer of 1943. Mr. A.R. Gallert, a seminary student, taught the following school term with Miss Eileen Witte teaching the lower

grades. This was the first year that the school was divided in two separate rooms.

After almost thirty years of labor in the congregation,

After almost thirty years of labor in the congregation, Pastor Tonn accepted a Call to Pleasant Plains, III., May 7, 1944. Pastor Koppelmann of Jacksonville than served as vacancy Pastor.

Pastor Raymond H. Witt of Coal Valley, III., accepted the Call of the congregation and was installed in July of 1944.

Mr. Raymond Witzke and Louise Lovekamp taught school during the school term of 1944-45. In the summer of 1945, Mr. H. Moldenhauer was called as teacher and principal. Miss Louise Lovekamp taught the lower grades, followed by Miss Lois Beck in 1945, and Miss Ruth Schrieber in 1947.

For some time now the congregation realized the need of a larger school. As early as 1936 it had been discussed, and in January, 1937, it had been decided to start a special school building fund with a special collection on two Sundays a year. Then in 1943 it was resolved to build a new school. During these years more plans were formulated and discussed and so it was with this in mind on October 14, 1944, the Schnake property which adjoined the church property on Washington Ave., to the east was purchased. It consisted of a house and several sheds and was purchased for \$2600. Also, at the same time, a small piece of ground adjoining this lot was purchased from Schnakes for an additional \$400.

Pastor Witt received a Call to Ottawa, Canada, and was granted his release on December 18, 1946. Pastor Koppelmann was again asked to be the vacancy pastor.

Pastor Winfred Neuendorf of Vallonia, Indiana, was the next pastor to serve the congregation and was installed on June 29, 1947.

On the last Sunday in October, 1947, the 75th anniversary was celebrated. Pastor Tonn delivered the sermon in the morning service, Pastor Fred Wessler in the afternoon service, and Pastor Witt spoke in the evening. At this time the congregation numbered 433 souls and 324 communicants.

Work was finally begun on the new school building in April of 1947. The old school building was sold and torn down in April. Some of the classes were held in the basement of the church and the lower grades in the teacher's house.

On June 26, 1948, Teacher Herbert Moldenhauer, received a Call and asked for his release. Mrs. Arthur Christianer and Miss Ruth Schrieber then taught the following year.

On July 31, 1949, the new school was dedicated at 2:30 p.m. with Pastor Koppelmann as the speaker. The cost of the building was approximately \$90,000, including the changes to the church basement. The first teachers in the new school were Mr. C.J. Nicol, principal, and Miss Mildred Klasowsky teaching the primary grades. In 1950, Miss Armita Chicks was hired to teach the lower grades. Teacher Nicol accepted a Call to Clayton in September 1952. Mrs. Aldo Engelbrecht was hired to teach the upper grades September 1952.


In November, 1951, the Fellowship League was organized for the

young married couples of the congregation.

In October, 1952, Pastor Neuendorf received a Call to Marquette Heights, Illinois, and so in a meeting on October 19, 1952, was granted his release. Pastor Beiderwieden of Havana served as vacancy Pastor. Pastor Henry Allwardt of Marysville, Ohio, answered the Call of the congregation and was installed in June 1953.

Teacher Ray Richert was installed on August 2, 1953, and served until June 30, 1957, when he accepted a Call to Detroit, Michigan.

In a meeting on March 3, 1957, it was decided that the school could no longer get along with only two teachers, so the school board was authorized to hire a third teacher. Mr. Conrad Germeroth was called to be principal and teach

the sixth, seventh and eighth grades. Miss Shirley Sanders was hired to teach the third, fourth and fifth grades, and Mrs. Engelbrecht to teach the first and second grades. The playroom in the basement of the school was converted into

the third room. So when school opened in the fall of 1957 for the first time since its beginning, the school had three rooms and three teachers.

In the spring of 1957 the tall steeple of the church was removed as it was reported to be in very bad condition.

On November 2, 1958, Pastor Allwardt was granted a release to accept a Call to Vandalia, III. Pastor Rose of Jacksonville served as vacancy Pastor. Pastor Roland Welch of Fountain City, Wis., accepted the Call of the congregation and was installed on July 19, 1959.

Mrs. Shirley Sanders Paul, resigned in the spring of 1959 and Miss Nela Treadway was hired to finish the school term. Mr. Norbert Failing, a student at River Forest, taught the fourth, fifth and sixth grades during the school term 1959-60. Then on July 1, 1960, Mr. Germeroth resigned due to ill health. During the school year 1960-61, it was again necessary to only have two school rooms, due to the shortage of teachers. Mrs. Engelbrecht and Miss Nela Treadway were the two teachers hired. Since Miss Treadway was not a member of the congregation, Mrs. Helen Winkelman taught religion to the sixth grade while the Pastor instructed the confirmation class.

Mr. Kenneth Kulow was the graduate teacher sent to the congregation in July 1961. When school opened in the fall of 1961, Kindergarten was added with Mrs. Robert Werries as teacher.

The Thyen property adjoining the church property to the east on Frederick Street was purchased on May 20, 1962 for \$5500. On the property was a large two story house, that was to be used for Kindergarten and Sunday School rooms.

September 1963, Mrs. Gus Schone was hired as the fourth teacher to teach fourth, fifth and sixth grades.

April, 1964, a new house was purchased to serve as a teacherage and was dedicated on July 26, 1964. The teacherage was located on the corner of Frederick St. and Mary St. The old teacherage on Washington Ave. was torn down and the vacant lot was a welcome addition to the playground.

Mrs. Linda Lovekamp began her duties as Kindergarten teacher on January 12, 1965, replacing Mrs. Robert Werries who resigned the latter part of 1964.

After faithfully serving the congregation for 15 years,

Mrs. Aldo Engelbrecht, resigned her teaching position in May, 1967, and Mrs. Dianne Warner was hired to teach grades 1, 2 and 3. She was inducted into office on August 27, 1967.

Pastor Roland Welch accepted a Call to St. Pauls, Hopkins, Michigan and St. Peters, Dorr, Michigan. Pastor Welch preached his farewell sermon on December 10, 1967. Pastor Robert Kuhn of Bath, Illinois served as vacancy Pastor.

Rev. Louis C. Knief accepted the Call to Trinity and was installed in a service on October 27, 1968. Pastor Kuhn served as liturgist, Pastor Beiderwieden of Havana delivered the sermon, and Dr. Niemoeller, District President, performed the rite of installation.

Mrs. Dianne Warner resigned as teacher of grades 1-3 and Miss Kathleen Cairns of Lombard, Illinois, was assigned to Trinity by the Board of Assignments. Miss Cairns was inducted as teacher of grades 1-3 on August 25, 1968.

Mrs. Gus Schone resigned her teaching position in 1970 and Mr. Fred Wahls was hired to teach grades 4, 5, and 6 beginning November 30, 1970. The voters then decided in 1971 to extend Mr. Wahls a Divine Call as Teacher and Director of Christian Youth and to this office he was installed on June 20, 1971.

Mrs. Kathleen Cairns Wessler resigned her position and Miss Judy Messerschmidt was hired and inducted as primary teacher and Director of Music on August 22, 1971.

In 1971 Trinity's youth changed their name from Walther League to ACTS (Active Christian Teens in Service).

The building immediately to the west of the church known as the "Meyer Building" was donated to Trinity by Mr. & Mrs. A.C. Hart during the summer of 1971.

As we begin our centennial celebration Trinity, Arenzville numbers 172 families, 474 baptized souls, 359 communicants and 74 voting members. During this 100 year period, 915 persons were received into the Kingdom of God's grace through Holy Baptism, 785 persons were confirmed (676 children, 109 adults), 281 couples were united in Holy Wedlock, and 249 persons were translated into the Kingdom of glory through death.

We close this history of Trinity's first hundred years with the words of the first pastor of the congregation as they appeared in the Lutheraner of February 15, 1874, "Now may the Lord Jesus Christ the head of the church also rule over this congregation, and through the pure preaching of his Word and the right administration of the sacraments ordained by Him lead yet many souls that they may taste and see how good the Lord is."


